Quiet Time

A quiet time is the part of the day that we set aside for the worship of God, for the reading of the Word of God and for fellowship with God so that we would know Him more, know ourselves in light of Him, and know the world according to His perspective.

Five Means of Bible Intake

- 1. Hearing the Bible
- 2. Reading the Bible
- 3. Studying the Bible
- 4. Memorizing the Bible
- 5. Meditating on the Bible

What we need to study the Bible

- 1) A heart of prayer and humility
 - Humble hearts are guided by the Holy Spirit - John 14:26
 - Humble hearts are amazed by God
 - Romans 11:33-36
- 2) A Bible everything you need is in the text.

Inductive Bible study: observe, interpret, apply

 Observe - 6 Questions <u>WHO</u> is speaking? <u>WHO</u> is the audience? <u>WHAT</u> is he saying? <u>WHY</u> is he telling them this? <u>HOW</u> does he make his appeal?

2) Interpret

- Remember that context rules
- Always seek the full counsel of God
- Look for the single meaning of the passage
- 3) Apply
 - James 1:22

Memorizing the Bible

Benefits of Memorizing Scripture

- Victory over sin - Psalm 119:9-11
- Victory over Satan
 - Matthew 4:4
- Preparation for witnessing and counseling - Proverbs 25:11

Tips for Memorizing Scripture

- 1) Pray
- 2) Set aside time
- 3) Repeat the text
- 4) Review
- 5) Have a plan
- 6) Memorize word for word
