

INTRODUCTION

Hebrews 10:26-39

Many years ago, my [Pastor Cisco] doctor told me that my cholesterol was getting high. He said if I didn't bring it down, "I'm going to put you on a pill!" My doctor's warning wasn't given just to scare me. Although, it did! My doctor wanted action. He wanted me to change my diet & exercise routine so my health would improve. With God's help, I was able to get the cholesterol down and have avoided that pill (so far!).

The writer of Hebrews issued several warnings. But he didn't issue them just to scare his readers. He wanted action. This is evident in this week's passage from Hebrews. "Like a good doctor, the writer has given a warning not primarily to frighten, but to remind the Hebrews of a better way of living. He has two weapons in his armory. First, he calls them in verse 32 to 'remember', ever a good Christian exercise. It had become easy to forget the first zeal for the gospel in spite of persecution and prison. This forgetfulness can happen in individuals and in churches, and is often the byproduct of more comfortable days. Just as wartime days can produce a new solidarity in the hour of danger, so tough days for the gospel can draw Christians together and nerve the arm; days of ease do the reverse.

The other weapon is his expression of confidence in his readers that they will, in fact, show resolve. He does that beautifully in verse 39 by putting himself in the equation, with one of those 'we' passages that make you walk tall. Testing days are coming; resolve is needed; but we move towards the day of the Lord's return and all its glory."
