SERMON APPLICATION GUIDE

JOHN 12:12-36a

DISCUSSION 1: The King on a Colt (vs.12-19)

- 1. Who do the crowds think Jesus is? What were they expecting Jesus to do? What in the text helps you to understand the crowd's expectations?
- 2. What was the purpose for Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a colt rather than a war horse? What does Zechariah 9:9-13 tell us about the coming Messiah?
- 3. How is Jesus a better King than any of the Israelites waving palm branches could fathom?
- 4. Why were the Pharisees so exasperated by the popularity of Jesus? How ought we to examine ourselves and our hearts in light of their response to Jesus?

DISCUSSION 2: The King for All Nations (vs. 20-26)

- 1. What is so significant about two Greeks requesting to see Jesus such an important moment John's gospel?
- 2. Jesus has alluded to his "hour" throughout the gospel (2:4; 4:21,23; 7:30; 8:20). What does this hour signify? What does it mean for the Son of Man to be glorified?
- 3. How should we understand Jesus' metaphor in vs. 24? How does it apply to Jesus? How does it apply to following Jesus?
- 4. What does it look like to lose your life for the sake of Jesus? What are the characteristics of a life lived for the present and one lived eternity in mind? What are ways you are tempted to live for yourself rather than for Jesus?
- 5. Who do you look up to that is completely sold out for Jesus? What in their life tells you that Jesus is worth more than anything?

DISCUSSION 3: The King Lifted Up (vs. 27-36a)

- 1. Jesus tells us that his soul is troubled in vs 27. What is troubling to Jesus? How does this prayer mirror Jesus' prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane (Luke 22:42)? What motivates Jesus to continue with the plan of God?
- 2. How does God the Father respond to Jesus' prayer?
- 3. According to this passage, what will Jesus work on the cross accomplish and what are the implications for us today?
- 4. How might this passage of Scripture fuel global missions in our church?

FAMILY DISCIPLESHIP QUESTIONS

- 1. The crowd on Palm Sunday cries out "Hosanna!" which means "save us!" What does Jesus save us from?
- 2. Who did Jesus come to save? What did he save us from and how did he do it?
- 3. Why is it better to serve Jesus rather than ourselves? How can you serve Jesus today?
